Waiting Like David

The Yiddish mentality is not haughty. It does not take victory for granted. It does not demand and command but it muddles through, sneaks by, smuggles itself amidst the powers of destruction, knowing somewhere that God's plan for Creation is still at the very beginning.

--Isaac Bashevis Singer, Nobel Lecture

So David and Abishai went to the army by night, and there was Saul, lying asleep inside the camp with his spear stuck in the ground near his head. Abner and the soldiers were lying around him.

Abishai said to David, "Today God has delivered your enemy into your hands. Now let me pin him to the ground with one thrust of the spear; I won't strike him twice."

But David said to Abshai, "Don't destroy him! Who can lay a hand on the Lord's anointed and be guiltless? As surely as the Lord lives," he said, "the Lord himself will strike him, or his time will come and he will die, or he will go into battle and perish. But the Lord forbid that I should lay a hand on the Lord's anointed."

Saul, David's former mentor and present tormentor, was within David's grasp. Saul was sleeping within mere feet of David, ready to be slain, and David's aggressive servant. Abishai, declared: Let me at him!

But David said; Wait. Whatever happens to Saul will happen. Who am I, David declared, to get ahead of God's plan? God has a purpose for every single person on earth—even our enemies. It is not our job to stand in the way. we may be tempted in the coming days to drive the knife in, and then deeper, perhaps deservedly so. But the great ones—like David, like Christ—show grace. And let God work out the rest.

Let us acknowledge that this in-between-time is creating space for probability and promise. We are being given the time to pay attention to what might normally be overlooked. The intentional work we are doing in transition has given us the opportunity to create long-term effects for redeemer's life and ministry for years to come.

So, maybe we have to wait. But we need to practice active-waiting. Think about this in terms of a caterpillar. The caterpillar gathers everything it needs, crawls into a space that feels safe, latches onto something secure, weaves a shell-like substance around itself, and sits there—waiting. As the caterpillar waits, it is transformed from a crawler to a beautiful winged butterfly. That transformation cannot happen without a time of transition.

We have everything we need for this transformation to take place. We have a gifted and talented group of people, we have a God who loves us and wants to be a Co-creator with us in moving Redeemer forward.

Whatever happens in our search process will happen. In the meantime, we are to sow grace and care for one another live out our mission working towards our vision and let God work out the rest.



Bible Study Free For All

A dusty, old photo album has fallen into your hands, passed down to you from a long line of relatives—now long gone—who never seemed to care much for it, and seldom mentioned it. It seems to have been added to from time to time with different sized photos, on different album pages. Handwritten notes fall out as you turn the pages, mentioning some people whose names and histories you recognize, but many you do not. Now's the time to make sense of this collection, and add it to the other albums you have that reflect your more prominent ancestors and tell their stories.

But, on another glance, this may be a little family lore you might want to keep buried and forgotten!

In a significant way these notes and photos tell a story of how the habitual shortcomings of these people have complicated their relationship with God; how they exhibited a lack of confidence in God's power to accomplish what he had promised; how they longed for the good-old-days even if they were worse (but at least predictable); how they were in chronic rebellion against their leaders; and how they had a "seemingly irrepressible attraction to paganism"!

That's the assessment of Baruch A. Levine, Skirball Professor Emeritus of Bible and Ancient Near Eastern Studies, Hebrew and Judaic Studies at New York University, and the most prominent scholar alive today on the Book of Numbers. His two volume translation and commentary in The Anchor Bible series will be our primary guide as the Tuesday Morning Bible Study begins looking at the Book of Numbers starting September 8th. We will meet each Tuesday from 10 until 11:30 a.m. in the conference room at Redeemer. All you'll need to bring with you is a copy of the Bible, preferably one with annotations.

Come join us Tuesdays for spirited conversation and discussion, coffee, and good laughs! Any reference to our gatherings as a "free for all," is surely overblown, and should not deter you in any way: just ask any current class member!

"The children color them in" statement. Is a very true statement and has had a huge impact on my family's life first hand. I come from a large loving family and about 16 years ago one of my brother's children had major medical issues. As a family we all spend huge amounts of time at the Children's Hospital here in Dallas, comforting each other. I



will always be grateful for the people that donated coloring book and crayon to the Children's Hospital. It helped to keep our healthy children occupied, giving my brother, his wife and extended family time to talk to doctors and to grieve, when the loss of their youngest son came : (It was a very sorrowful time in my family's life. I can never repay the peace that this simple act of kindness meant to us at that time. That why I stand on my soapbox and proclaim the wonders of this ministry every time I get a chance :)

When you see the color crayons on sale during the back to school sales. Pick up a couple extra boxes and drop them off in the back of the Church. I promise you that you just helped Jesus performed another miracle. I wish I didn't know first hand the power of this ministry, but I do know that it works! I will always be grateful for this wonderful program. In the past our own youth groups have been involved in this ministry and have always enjoyed break up the crayons in small bags, so that the Hospital volunteers can hand them out to the children in the waiting areas. Please, please help support this life changing experience.

Lastly Irving Care needs our support to help feed the less fortunate right here in Irving! Most of us go to bed every night with a satisfied stomach. But right here in Irving we have children that go to bed every night hungry. While we can't stop hunger by



Austin Street Center

A Heart for the People

A Home for the Homeless

Redeemer has a dedicated group that meets on the Saturday before the second Sunday and prepares sandwiches for the people who need Austin Street Center. Then on the following day they meet here at the church and go to St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Farmers Branch and help prepare a meal which they take to Austin Street Center and serve. The sandwiches they prepared are distributed in lunch sacks to the men and women at ASC for them to have a lunch the next day.

This month that will be: The Sandwich Team at 11:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 12, and Sunday, September 13 at 3:45 p.m. to prepare and serve supper

For nearly 30 years, Austin Street Center has developed into a “whole person” therapeutic homeless community, evolving from a basic overnight emergency shelter facility (without air conditioning or cots!) to a full “Care Campus,” that today includes a transitional living facility for those with employment, substance abuse and psychological counseling, a free-standing chapel and an outdoor playground for our shelter kids.

Austin Street Center was created in 1983 when overcrowded mental health institutions left many individuals with no alternative but a life on the streets. The late Henry C. Beck Jr. and former Dallas Mayor Starke Taylor arranged to lease space at 723 South Austin Street in downtown Dallas near Reunion Arena for \$1 per month. The shelter was moved to its current location, 2929 Hickory Street, in 1992. Rev. Father Jerry Hill was appointed the shelter's first Executive Director. Rev. Hill was later succeeded by Rev. Fathers Bubba and Harry Dailey.

Supported by volunteers from 120 Dallas-area churches and civic organizations, and funded entirely by individuals and foundations, Austin Street Center accepts no government funding from any level, and no United Way funding. Since its inception, Austin Street Center has provided shelter for an average of 300 men and women – at no cost to the individual.

Because we neither solicit nor do we accept government funding from any level, all services are provided at no cost to Dallas County taxpayers. We are debt free.

Statement to Austin Street's Durability and Longevity: Debt Free: All program enhancements and facility improvements have been accomplished without debt.

Long Term Relationships: We have maintained volunteer relationships with area churches, synagogues, schools and civic organizations for nearly three decades. We are led by an impressive group of community leaders who serve on our Board of Trustees.

The involvement and devotion of these individuals and groups serves as an important metric of our success, knowing that people remain involved when the results of their time and talent have meaningful impact.

RMS Schoolwide September Service Project

Every month we try to do a service project as a school. For the month of September we have elected to pledge our support to Reverse Litter. It is a simple pledge that you make online to pick up 10 pieces of litter every Tuesday. If Tuesday, doesn't work for you then pick a day of the week that does! The goal is for each member of the family to sign up on reverselitter.com and pledge to pick up 10 pieces of litter a week for the entire month (and for as long as you can keep it going!). The upper elementary students will be holding families accountable for the project and will be calculating how much in weight we are collecting. What a great way to turn a simple service project into a Montessori based learning experience for the children!

We had a fantastic visit to Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children. We toured the facility and learned a lot about the hospital and the community they serve. We raised **\$1199.75** though collecting pledges for our weekly walking. Congratulations to everyone and thank you for your support!

For 2015-2016

Each week, the Upper Elementary class spends one of their P.E. days walking for charity. At the beginning of the year, the students collect pledges from family and friends and walk 2 miles each Thursday, rain or shine. At the end of the year, they collect the pledges, and they present their earned money to a local charity. The Upper Elementary students named their cause "Miles of Hope".

The Upper Elementary class has a 3-year rotation of charities that benefit from their hard work. The charities are Irving No-Kill Animal Shelter, Scottish Rite Hospital for Children, and the Senior Source. This year, the class is working with the Senior Source, a non-profit organization that helps the senior population of Dallas County. At the end of the year, the money collected by the students will purchase I-Pods for Alzheimer's patients at an Irving senior living facility. The I-Pods will be given to each Alzheimer's patient with their favorite genre of music downloaded. Music therapy has been shown to have many positive effects on these patients. The children are very excited about this project!
